



# Aangan Trust

## Mumbai, India



### PROBLEM

- There are roughly 800 state-run children’s homes all over India, caring for about 100’000 children annually.
- Conditions in these state-run child-care institutions, before Aangan started its work, were inhumane and prison-like; children would stay here for an average of 3 years.
- Children come from backgrounds of deep neglect and chronic violence; they have been accused of crimes, abandoned by their parents, or exploited by criminals and even family members.

### SOLUTION

- Aangan works closely with the government to implement a more child-friendly and rehabilitative system of care in children’s homes; its work also includes additional prevention and community-based programs.
- Aangan has created a model combining three components:
  - (1) A monitoring and evaluation tool
  - (2) An operational manual, and
  - (3) Capacity building workshops designed for the staff running the institutions.

### ENGAGEMENT OF LGT VENTURE PHILANTHROPY

- A performance dependent grant of USD 467’000 paid over four years to fund the expansion into 100 homes in four new states – translating into a direct impact on the lives of 12 500 more children each year
- Aangan is part of LGT Venture Philanthropy’s iCats Program and of LGT’s Employee Donation Program.
- Aangan has access to LGT Venture Philanthropy’s network and receives ongoing mentoring support.

- By 2012, Aangan aims for its outreach to cover over 475 homes and impact 47’500 children through its institutional and community based programs
